## U.S. HOUSING STARTS AT 13-YEAR HIGH, FACTORY OUTPUT GAINS – (*Reuters*)

U.S. homebuilding surged to a 13-year high in December as activity increased across the board, suggesting the housing market recovery was back on track. The rise in construction, together with an increase in completions and the inventory of homes under construction, could ease a housing shortage that has constrained sales over the last couple of years. #### WHO'S TO BLAME FOR HIGH HOUSING COSTS? - (Brookings)

Public debate falls into two schools of thought as to why housing costs are so high in many parts of the U.S. The YIMBY ("Yes In My Backyard") school argues that housing is expensive because local governments - and voters - have adopted overly restrictive land use regulations that limit the construction of new housing. On the other hand, left-leaning politicians like Bernie Sanders contend that housing is expensive because "corrupt real estate developers are gentrifying neighborhoods." So which is it? More.
