1. In the past 10 years while education funding was increasing, and the number of teachers was increasing, our nation's educational standing in the world fell. Why do you think we are losing ground?

educational leaders addressed the need for mandate reform, so they could function more like charter schools which have many fewer limitations imposed upon them. Where are we with legislative reforms that eliminate or reduce the many mandates that hamper our public schools? Be specific about the status of proposed mandates.

Microsoft and IBM recently announced that instead of their normal policy to contribute money and make grants to K-12 and higher education, they will be increasingly using that money to establish their own educational institutions that will deliver the quality of graduates they want to hire. If the aim of education is to prepare people for good jobs, and our nation's premier employers believe that the quality of our current educational system doesn't meet their hiring needs, what message are they sending that PA education needs to listen and react to?



9. Act 1 restricted real estate tax increases to the State mandate. Unfortunately, three exemptions have permitted 69% of school districts to exceed the mandate. Don't the exceptions in Act 1 cripple the intent of the mandate?

10. The performance of, and community confidence in, a school district is highly dependent upon leadership. If you agree with this statement, then doesn't it make sense that leaders at the board level and senior management levels possess certain qualifications? Board members and school leaders are now evermore required to make decisions that are far-reaching academically, legally and financially.
